

<u>Title: Sent into Darkness</u> <u>July 18, 2021</u>

**Key Scripture: Esther 1:1-2:4** 

#### 1) All humanity <u>dwells</u> amidst <u>darkness</u>.

Ephesians 2:1–3 ... "And you were dead in the trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, following the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience— among whom we all once lived in the passions of our flesh, carrying out the desires of the body and the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, like the rest of mankind."

## 2) We are <u>called</u> out of darkness and <u>sent</u> into darkness.

Ephesians 5:8 ... "for at one time you were darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light"

#### 3) God is <u>present</u> and at <u>work</u> in the darkness.

John 1:4–5 ... "In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."
