

HONOR EVERYONE: HUMAN INSTITUTIONS

<u>Human institutions</u> are organizations created by people and established by God. (Ex. Government, military, schools, etc.)

Principles and purposes of submitting to every human institution:

- 1) We are <u>free</u> in Christ.
- 2) The purpose of our freedom is to <u>willingly serve</u> God.
- 3) We serve God when we <u>submit</u> to human institutions.
- 4) God has a purpose for human institutions.

Romans 13:1–4 ... "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Would you have no fear of the one who is in authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive his approval, for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer."

Questions to Consider

- 1) Do I tend to honor and obey governing authorities or resist them? Why?
- 2) What makes it difficult to honor and obey governing authorities?
- 3) How does the example of Jesus Christ teach us to do this even when it is difficult?
- 4) When is it appropriate to not obey governing authorities and how should we lovingly resist as followers of Jesus?
