

LIVING STONES HAVE NAMES 1 PETER 5:12-14

1) God knows our <u>name</u>.

Romans 8:14–15 ... "For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, "Abba! Father!""

2) God <u>sees</u> us when we are <u>invisible</u> to everyone else.

Matthew 6:3–4 ... "But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you."

3) God gives us peace in Christ.

John 3:17–18 ... "For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe is condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God."

- 2) What was a time I grew bitter or jaded about work that was unappreciated, forgotten, or ignored?
